BOB DOUGLAS Observing Deep Sky Objects From Australia



This talk will include a discussion and pictures of some of the major deep sky objects not observable from the continental US and who to get in contact with if you'd like to do some observing in Australia. For a combination of dark skies, amateur astronomers who welcome foreign visitors and the best latitude from the earth at which to observe the blockbuster objects in the night sky, Australia is the place to go. Four of my favorite five objects in the sky are essentially not observable from California.

I grew up in Seattle. Ever since grade school, I have been interested in astronomy and space travel. In the early morning hours, I would stick my head out of my bedroom window (which faced east) to see the "new" constellations coming up. When I was 13 or 14, my father bought me a 2.4 inch f/15 Unitron refractor.

I was an undergraduate and graduate student at the University of Washington in Seattle, receiving my BS, MS and Ph.D. in Mathematics. After a year as a Research Associate at the University of North Carolina at Chapel Hill, I joined the faculty of the Mathematics Department at San Francisco State University. About 15 years later, the computer science program in the Mathematics Dept. became a separate Department of Computer Science, which I switched into. I retired in 2000 as a Professor of Mathematics and Computer Science.

Starting in 2001, I have traveled to Australia four times. On the first trip I took an 8" SC with me, but have made astronomy friends there and have had access to larger scopes. On the second trip, I traveled about a third of the way across Australia with them to view the solar eclipse. On the third trip, I spent 7.5 weeks in Australia (over two new moon periods), renting a cabin near Sliding Springs Observatory for three weeks of viewing every night. It was great! Between new moon periods, I drove over 3,000 miles, went to a Great Barrier Reef coral island and hiked in the subtropical rain forests just south of Brisbane. In October 2005, I returned and will be going for my fifth trip in March 2007. I have found that there is a bond between amateur astronomers all over the world. It's a good way to make close friends quickly. This has happened to me in Australia and in the Bay Area (through SFAA and through meeting people observing at Lake Sonoma).

My main astronomical interest is in deep sky visual observing, which I have done for many years. Up until 2004, I mainly used my 12" LX200 Meade. Since then I have used an 18" GoTo Starmaster.

My wife, Fran, is interested in astronomy, but not sufficiently to stay up late. Bob Douglas



From Marin County: Take US-101 SOUTH over the Golden Gate Bridge. Continue on RICHARDSON AVENUE, go 0.2 miles. Continue on LOMBARD STREET, go 1.1 miles. Turn left on VAN NESS AVENUE, go 0.2 miles.
